Self-Evaluation Examination (SEE) Professional Aspects

The SEE was reconfigured in September 2016 to more closely reflect the NCE content domains. Effective May 1, 2018, the SEE incorporated Professional Aspects in General Principles of Anesthesia (Domain 3) to mirror the NCE content update from January 2018. SEE Handbook Heads-up

There are currently three *SEE Handbooks* on our website, each with a specific purpose. The major difference in these handbooks is reflected in the content outlines, which have evolved over time. Students in your program may have taken an earlier version of the SEE that reflected an exam content outline housed in these handbooks. We keep the earlier versions on the website because each outline provides a reference for comparative score analysis for individuals who took that version of the exam. The take-home message is this – check to be sure you are looking at the right version of the handbook so that the information you are utilizing is aligned with the version of the exam your students took. NBCRNA Exam Fees

NCE: The initial NCE exam fee of \$725 and subsequent exam fee of \$625 have remained the same since 2009. After nine years of stabilized fees, the NBCRNA Board has approved fee changes to the NCE. The new fees will be implemented in January 2019. The NCE fee and NCE retake fee both will increase to **\$995**.

SEE: The reconfigured SEE was launched in September 2016. At that time, fees were increased from \$135 to \$160 to reflect the increased testing time of a four-hour (new format) versus a three-hour exam (old format). The NBCRNA Board has approved a new SEE fee of **\$250** effective January 2019. The fee increase allows the NBCRNA to now cover the costs associated with exam delivery and makes the exam a breakeven offering.

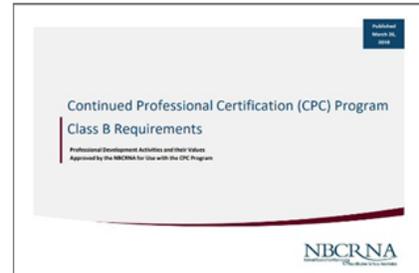

Class B Credit for Teaching in the Clinical Setting

We are frequently asked about Class B credit for teaching in the clinical setting. Direct clinical supervision of student nurse anesthetists can earn one Class B credit for each day. Clinical supervisors are responsible for keeping track of the dates and time instruction occurred and will be asked to provide a contact email for an individual capable of verification. If a “full” day is not spent teaching, the hours may be accrued with eight hours equaling one day. Consult the [Class B Table](#) for more information.
